Quality of Life satellite location offers more choices for individuals experiencing disability

In early 2019, a capital investment from the Ministry of Social Services provided support to the Saskatoon Branch to establish a second Quality of Life satellite location in Saskatoon. This funding provided the Saskatoon Branch with the opportunity to create a space that is inviting and is designed to engage clients with safety, accessibility and comfort at its core.

The program, which is located on Jessop Avenue in Saskatoon, celebrated its grand opening on Friday, January 31. Representatives from the provincial and municipal government, program clients, members of the community and of other community-based organizations joined SaskAbilities Board and staff members for the celebration.

Crystal, a Quality of Life client, welcomed guests to the grand opening saying, "I've been at SaskAbilities for about 3½ years and I enjoy being here at Jessop Avenue and like the fun stuff we do. Thank you for my fun experience here!"

The ribbon cutting ceremony included words of dedication from the Honourable Paul Merriman, Minister of Social Services. His Worship Charlie Clark, Mayor of Saskatoon, brought greetings on behalf of the City of Saskatoon.

Tom Spence, SaskAbilities Board President said, "Over the last 70 years, services and programs have changed, but the core goal to support clients and community remains at the forefront of everything we do. This new space will provide inclusive opportunities for people experiencing disability to enrich their lives. Individuals can learn new skills, develop friendships, and experience life in a meaningful and fun way. A great deal of thought has gone into each room here at Jessop Avenue – to make it a great place for people to come together."

The Quality of Life satellite program provides community-based support for adults experiencing disability. Clients choose activities for the day based on their unique goals and interests. Individuals spend time both at the Quality of Life centre and in the community. Activities include physical activity, such as swimming, walking and dancing, as well as volunteering, skill building, arts and music. Outing schedules are built around clients to ensure that clients have opportunity to pursue their own interests.

As of 2020 SaskAbilities now offers three Quality of Life programs in Saskatoon with hopes of opening additional satellite locations in the future to accommodate the high levels of interest.

Yorkton Respite Program


Respite care is a key component of any caregiving program. It supports families by providing temporary care for a loved one who requires assistance. This important service temporarily relieves primary caregivers of their duties so that they can have a needed rest, recharge their batteries or address temporary short-term scheduling conflicts.

It was identified that the Yorkton region would benefit from a respite program to help meet the needs of families and caregivers of individuals who experience disability. SaskAbilities' Respite Program was developed in October of 2017 with support from various community organizations. In 2019, the program was utilized by 25 families.



Courage is a young man who enjoys exploring and interacting with people around him and his environment. He is always smiling and cheerful to everyone and such a pleasure to spend time with. Courage and his father Guy were one of the first families to join the program. Support workers from the program pick Courage up from his home to attend the program. He accesses both group programming as well as individual one-on-one activities. Guy said, "This program is so helpful to families in the Yorkton area. The Respite Program has given me the opportunity to have this time to have a break from caregiving and participate in activities I would otherwise not be able to be part of. It also gives Courage a chance to experience independence from his family, something that is an important part of growing up for any child."

The SaskAbilities Respite Program offers both community activities and programming at the Yorkton Quality of Life Centre. Courage enjoys a wide range of activities while attending the program, such as swimming, visiting petting zoos and spending time outdoors, especially at the Yorkton splash park where he always enjoys an opportunity to sit in the hot tub. One of Courage's favourite activities at the Centre is music time where he loves playing the chimes.
