came into our care, everything changed," explains Kathryn of Kane's journey since adoption. Even with the bleak news, Kane's dad knew immediately that the doctor's prognosis wasn't exactly accurate. "There's a lot of life in Kane," laughs Justin, "and he's always been someone who has defied expectations. He has come a long way, and much of that has to do with the love and support he's received, not just from me and Kathryn but from all the people who have come into his life. He seems to thrive and get nourishment from people believing in him and positive environments."

One of those positive environments is, of course, Camp Easter Seal. Kane has been attending Camp since he was six years old. Now at 15, Kane is well versed in what to expect during his week-long stay at Camp Easter Seal, and according to his parents, the excitement and anticipation are still there!
