For new campers and their loved ones, the anticipation of Camp is sure to bring a mix of emotions, including excitement with a pinch of anxiety around the unknown. This was precisely the case for first-time camper Naven and his mom, Kenya.

The decision to send Naven to Camp was relatively easy for Kenya. Residing in a small city northeast of Camp Easter Seal with a population of just under 6,000, there are few options for programs and services for children like Naven. "I heard about Camp through my mom's friend who works at a group home where many residents go each summer. We applied the first year and didn't get in, so when we applied this past year and were accepted, Naven was really excited to go. On the other hand, I was quite nervous," admits Kenya. "I was allowed to go with him, which definitely helped my nerves." The mom of two boys was unsure how the change in scheduling and routine would impact Naven, who loves being around his younger brother and thrives in structured environments. Nevertheless, on July 17, Naven and Kenya made their way south, arriving for their very first week at Camp Easter Seal.

Whatever nerves might have remained for Kenya at the start of the week quickly dissipated as she explored the grounds each day, watching her son make friends and find joy in new activities and experiences. "Naven is a goofball; he generally likes to have fun and joke around. He's a very loving,

They had a carnival when we were there, which Naven enjoyed and really took to the dunk-tank," laughs Kenya, giving a small glimpse into the exciting week Naven had at Camp. "He adjusted really well and did better than I thought he would. Even at night, he was so exhausted from all the activities that he just went to bed and slept through until the morning."

While there were many highlights of Naven's first week of Camp, the friendship formed between her son and fellow camper, Owen, was most touching for Kenya. "Naven did make a friend at Camp that we have managed to see a few times since. There aren't a lot of kids with Down syndrome where we are from, and there were two in Naven's cabin, which was cool," shares Kenya, who has made the drive with Naven to Saskatoon so the two boys can further their friendship, play, and hang out.

With a successful first camping experience behind them and a new friendship made, we couldn't help but wonder if Naven would be returning to Camp Easter Seal for even more adventures and fun! We are happy to share that Kenya has applied for her son to return to Camp for summer 2024. When checking in with Naven to see how he feels about the big news ... if you can imagine the biggest smile possible and a very excited "Yes!" that was his response.
